Course Description

Are you ready to find work you love? With the guidance of career professionals and recruiters deeply rooted in BC's vibrant creative and tech industries, you'll practice writing resumes, interviewing, and making new connections. As you build confidence in your skills and strengths, you'll discover exciting opportunities in your field, and focus your work search towards careers aligned with your interests.

With access to recruiters in BC's creative and tech sectors, and the support of a community of learners and coaches, hone your personal presentation skills, craft market-ready resumes, deliver impactful interviews, and maintain optimistic mindsets, in the search for exciting work.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to successfully navigate the job market, and:

- Identify exciting work options, highlight marketable skills, and grow their networks
- Receive personalized feedback on applications from hiring professionals and coaches
- Develop targeted resume-writing skills, and become interview-ready through practice
- Be supported to maintain optimism and a growth mindset in their search for work

Format of the course

This is a 30-hour long online course and will run for **6 weeks**. It is expected that students will spend around 4-5 hours per week on self-directed learning. Weekly Zoom sessions will support participants to build community, discuss challenges, and bring clarity to the kinds of work they want to do in the world.

Materials such as resumes, cover letters and profiles will be created and submitted for feedback, and interview skills can be practiced with recruiters and coaches. Activities and assignments will encourage personal growth, development of a professional brand, and awareness of values and strengths.
